Lincoln on his knees

General Daniel E. Sickles has recorded for us this intimate revelation from the heart of the Great Emancipator. The General had been severely wounded on July 2, 1863, and after suffering the amputation of a leg, was removed to Washington where he was visited by the President. We quote from General Sickles:

"Mr. Lincoln, we heard at Gettysburg that here at the Capitol you were all so anxious about the results of the battle that the government officials packed up and got ready to leave at short notice with the official archives." "Yes," he said. "Some precautions were prudently taken, but for my part I was sure of our success at Gettysburg."

"Why," I asked, "were-you so confident? The Army of the Potomac had suffered many reverses."

There was a pause. The President seemed in deep meditation. His pale face was lighted up by an expression I had not observed before. Turning to me he said:

"When Lee crossed the Potomac and entered Pennsylvania followed by our army, I felt that the crisis had come. I knew that defeat in a great battle on Northern soil involved the loss of Washington, to be followed, perhaps, by the intervention of England and France in favor of the Southern Confederacy. I went to my room and got down on my knees in prayer. Never before had I prayed with so much earnestness. I wish I could repeat my prayer."

Lincoln continued, "I felt that I must put all my trust in Almighty God. He gave our people the best country ever given to man. He alone could save it from destruction. I had tried my best to do my duty and found myself unequal to the task. The burden was more than I could bear. God had often been our Protector in other days. I prayed that He would not let the nation perish. I asked Him to help us and give us the victory now. I felt that my prayer was answered. I had no misgivings about the result of Gettysburg."

Abraham Lincoln, our 16th president, was born on February 12, 1809, and George Washington, our first president and the father of our country, on February 22, 1732.

This is a good time to review our history in order to understand our times. Any thinking person would ponder the difference in our citizenry today and in earlier years. Frankly, we have witnessed a nation sowing to the wind and now reaping a whirlwind. We are witnessing with our own eyes the paganization of America.

In an article in the **New York Times** (October 6, 2006), Laurie Gobdstein said that the number of evangelical Christian teenagers could be declining rapidly, from thirty-five percent among baby boomers to four percent among today's Christian teenagers "if current trends continue." She quoted many young Christians who were having trouble keeping the faith in the midst of peer pressure, consumerism,

cynicism, and lust inflamed by the mass media of entertainment.

It is insightful to look at Great Britain's spiral downward. In 1950, seventy percent of all British children had a working knowledge of the Bible. Now it is reported to be around four percent. When there is no working knowledge of the Bible, we need not expect our children and youth to understand the biblical perspective that holds forth moral absolutes to guide our thinking and behavior: don't steal, lie, lust. Love your neighbor as yourself.

The Barna Research Group reports that nine

percent of Americans are Bible-believing evangelical Christians and thirty-six percent are born-again Christians. Barna reports an interesting finding that should be a red flag for Christians. On a given Sunday, forty-nine percent of Americans born between 1946 and 1964 attend church. The number drops to forty-three percent of those born between 1965 and 1983. It falls to thirty-three percent of Americans born between 1984 and 2002.

We are facing a serious problem. If the

United States becomes as post-Christian as Britain and Europe, then the world will become a ripe plum ready to fall under the hands of Islam, a religion that heretofore has only advanced by the sword. While many today maintain this is a secular nation, those who founded it took serious their covenant with God. If the covenant of the Pilgrims contained in the Mayflower Compact and other documents is to be taken as seriously by God as it was by those who wrote it in covenant with God, then this nation is well headed toward judgment. The righteous should be fasting and praying seeking God's mercy for our nation. I firmly believe that God does take that covenant seriously, even though our leaders and much of the nation do not. God calls His people to humble themselves, pray for His hand to move, seek His face, and turn from sin (2 Chronicles 7:14). God is able. He is willing to help us. He is waiting for us to call on Him.

Prayer in America's history

Prayer has saved America again and again from the earliest days of our history. In 1623

our pilgrim forefathers faced starvation. Three months without rain left the corn withered and the ground cracked. In great distress the pilgrims set aside a day of solemn humiliation to seek the Lord through humble and fervent prayer. The sky was clear when they began to pray, but toward evening clouds covered the heavens. Then a gentle rain set in and continued until the ground was thoroughly soaked and the pilgrims' spirit was revived.

Prayer was the key to David Brainerd's amazing ministry to the American Indians. He wrote in his diary, "I set apart this day for secret fasting and prayer. I was in such agony till near dark, that I was wet with sweat." On August 8, 1745, God answered. His Indian congregation was "almost universally praying and crying for mercy in every part of the house."

As the dark clouds of the Revolutionary War gathered, Congress set aside May 17, 1776 as a day of national fasting and prayer. John Witherspoon, a preacher, an educator, and a man with a deep prayer life, delivered the sermon. On July 4, he joined in signing the Declaration of Independence and then shared in praying while some wept.

During the Revolutionary War American soldiers endured hunger and a critical shortage of clothes and blankets during the bitter winter at Valley Forge. Yet the men were patient and uncomplaining. How was such loyalty and hope kept alive? The answer was uncovered by those who discovered George Washington on his knees in the woods, his cheeks wet with tears as he prayed.

When the British forces surrendered at Yorktown, General Washington ordered that a thanksgiving service be held the next day. He said, "The hand of Providence has been so conspicuous in all this, that he must be worse than an infidel that lacks faith, and more than wicked, that has not gratitude enough to acknowledge his obligations."

When the Constitutional Convention was hopelessly deadlocked in 1787, Benjamin Franklin turned things around with this timely reminder, "In the beginning of the contest with Britain, when we were sensible of danger, we

had daily prayers in this room for Divine protection. Our prayers, Sir, were heard, and they were graciously answered. All of us who were engaged in the struggle must have observed frequent instances of a superintending Providence in our favor...And have we now forgotten this powerful Friend? Or do we imagine we no longer need His assistance?

"I have lived, Sir, a long time, and the longer I live, the more convincing proofs I see of this truth: 'that God governs in the affairs of man.' And if a sparrow cannot fall to the ground without His notice, is it probable that an empire can rise without His aid? I therefore beg leave to move that, henceforth, prayers imploring the assistance of Heaven and its blessing on our deliberation be held in this assembly every morning before we proceed to business."

In the 1790's outlaws fled to the Kentucky frontier to escape conviction for murder, robbery, and other crimes. Criminals were so dominant that Logan County was nicknamed Rogues' Harbor. Moral recovery began when a Presbyterian minister named James McGready led his three small congregations to devote themselves to extraordinary prayer. Prayer gave birth to the great camp meeting revivals that drew crowds ranging from 10 to 25,000.

In 1794 Tom Paine was selling thousands of copies of his book, THE AGE OF REASON which viciously attacked the Bible. He was a leader of an anti-God movement which was sweeping the young nation. Isaac Backus, a New England Baptist pastor, wrote an urgent plea for prayer for revival to pastors of every Christian denomination in the United States. Churches, realizing their backs were to the wall, accepted this appeal. Alarmed Christians began praying for revival on the first Monday of each month. It was not long until revival broke out in Connecticut and spread to other states.

God was working mightily when Charles Finney preached in Utica, New York in 1826. Even folks who only stopped there for a meal or to spend the night were deeply convicted and converted. People sensed that God's presence dominated the town. Back of this

powerful work of the Spirit was a lady who spent days and nights in intercession. After Finney preached a few times in Auburn, New York an entire congregation confessed their backsliding and spiritual poverty. Many were weeping. Large numbers came to Christ. Back of Finney's ministry was a prayer helper named Daniel Nash who would pray for three or four hours a day.

Prayer shook what seemed to be the very gates of hell when even Hell-Corner, New Hampshire was touched by the Layman's Prayer Revival of 1857-58. Things began to change at Hell-Corner when one man's outrageous profanity led to a joking call for a prayer meeting. A notorious backslider tried to lead the meeting, but he broke down while praying. With the help of a deacon from a neighboring town the meetings continued. A breakthrough came when four or five hardened men were convicted of sin and then many at Hell-Corner became praying people.

In 1863, during the Civil War, the Senate asked President Lincoln to designate a national day of fasting, humiliation and prayer. Lincoln's proclamation warned, "We have been the recipients of the choicest bounties of ...Bút Heaven we have forgotten God...Intoxicated with unbroken success, we become self-sufficient...too proud to pray to the God that made us!"

Do Lincoln's searching words describe us? When have you seen a church filled with people gathered to humbly seek God in prayer concerning major moral or spiritual issues? How many still believe that the prayer of a righteous man avails much (James 5:16b)?

Moying the Hand that moves the world

The only hope for our families, our churches, and our nation is in groups large and small who meet regularly to pray for spiritual awakening in our church and moral recovery in our nation. Let's demonstrate again that prayer moves the Hand that moves the world.

The power of the bent knee

Birds go to sleep on their perches, but they never fall off. This is because of the tendons in the bird's legs. They are so constructed that when the leg is bent at the knee, the claws contract and grip like a steel trap. The claws refuse to let go until the knees are unbent again. The bent knee gives the bird the ability to hold on to his perch so lightly.

Isn't this also the secret of the holding power of the Christian? Daniel found this to be true. Surrounded by a pagan environment, tempted to compromise with evil, urged to weaken his grip on God, he refused to let go. He held firm when others faltered because he was a man of prayer. He knew the power of the bent knee.

From sleeping birds we can learn the secret of holding things which are most precious to us-honesty, purity, thoughtfulness, honor, character. That secret is the knee bent in prayer, seeking to get a firmer grip on those values that make life worth living. When we hold firmly to God in prayer, we can rest assured He will hold tightly to us.

ABIDING IN CHRIST

"I am the vine; you are the branches. He who abides in Me and I in him, bears much fruit; for without Me you can do nothing." John 15:5

A branch is a natural growth out of a vine or tree. The branch is totally dependent on the vine for nourishment and fruitfulness. The quality of the vine determines the quality of the branches and the fruit they produce, unless the branch is infected by disease. The branch does not need to do anything apart from abiding in the vine and remaining healthy. It will then bear all the good fruit in line with the character of the vine. When we became children of God by faith, we became branches growing out of the Vine—Jesus Christ.

PRAYER SEMINAR HELPS YOU GET STARTED!

Most Christians know the important place of prayer in the life of a believer. I do not have to make a case about that with you. But it is not easy to pray. It is easier to preach, to do youth work or the work of a deacon, to teach a Sunday school class, or to go visiting! Why is this?

I believe the reason Satan doesn't want a person to learn to pray is because prayer unleashes the power of God in the life of a believer. Satan trembles when he sees the weakest Christian on his knees. I will never win the war if I don't know where the battle is being fought. Prayer is the place!
