Early in the morning = Strength for the day!

"Now in the morning, having risen a long while before daylight, [Jesus] went out and departed to a solitary place; and there He prayed" (**Mark 1:35**).

Was prayer important to Jesus when He was on earth? It certainly was and most times He was alone. His ministry was brief, three and one-half years some say. During these first years, His daily schedule was packed full. Mark, especially, writes His Gospel in such a way as to reflect this. From sunrise until sunset, He was on the go teaching, preaching, and healing. Crowds pressed upon Him to the extent that He instructed His disciples to keep a small boat available that could be used as His pulpit. Read again: "**Jesus was moved with compassion**" **Let us never read these words without a sense of exultation and gratitude.**

Jesus rose a long while before daylight and went out to a place where He would be free from distraction and spend time in prayer. The Servant of Jehovah opened His ear each morning to receive instructions for the day from His Father (**Isaiah 50:4-5**). If the Lord Jesus felt the need of this **early morning quiet time**, how much more should we!

Notice that Jesus prayed when it cost Him something; He rose and went out **a long while before daylight**. Prayer should not be a matter of personal convenience, but of self-discipline and sacrifice. Does this explain why so much of our service makes no difference and exudes ineffectiveness?

By the time Peter and the other disciples got up, the crowd was gathered outside the door again. The disciples went to tell the Lord of the rising popular sentiment. Surprisingly, He did not go back into Capernaum, but took the disciples into the surrounding towns, explaining that He must preach there also (**Mark 1:38**). How unlike Jesus we often are when the crowds come. We would likely

tarry there and say "sing another song." When I was teaching this at a Christian & Missionary Alliance Church in Appleton, Wisconsin, a number of years ago, someone commented with tongue-in-cheek, "Yes and you Baptists would take another offering!" But Jesus did not go back to the city. Why? **He had just been in prayer and had learned what God wanted Him to do that day.** There is a lesson for all of us to learn in His example.

Jesus' great interest was on preaching the Word. The healing miracles that Mark told about, while certainly intended to relieve human misery, were also designed to gain attention for the preaching. Thus, Jesus went to the synagogues throughout all Galilee preaching and casting out demons. He combined preaching and practicing, saying and doing. It is interesting to see how often He cast out demons in synagogues. Would we be unkind to note that many churches today correspond to the synagogues?

Our time alone with God early in the morning can be a time of preparation for service during the day that is ahead. One guideline for each believer is preparation in private prepares us for encounters in public. The basic principle of service is fixed: we must spend time with Him before we move out as God's representative. Proclamation of the Word of God (either with one person or many) is the basic method of evangelism and must always be central. Nothing must be allowed to subordinate it.

It is obvious from looking at the role of prayer in the life of the Lord Jesus Christ that anointing comes and the enablement of the Holy Spirit

is unleashed as we pray. **Prayer is the work that must be done before all other work.** "Lord, teach us to pray!" (Luke 11:1).

Thanksgiving: The Religious Holiday

As we think of the Pilgrims who established the first Thanksgiving Day, we need to recall the reason they left the land of their birth and came to the New World. The Puritan separatists were not allowed to worship freely in England according to the dictates of their hearts and minds. In August of 1620, they boarded two small ships, the Speedwell and the Mayflower, in search of religious freedom in undeveloped America.

The Speedwell soon sprung leaks and most of the crew and passengers transferred to the Mayflower before the Speedwell turned back. There were 102 Pilgrims who suffered the 67 days of rough sailing before they finally landed in Plymouth Bay in November 1620.

Their troubles were just beginning. No housing awaited them. No reception group. No physicians or medical facilities. There were no stores. A cold winter lay ahead with sickness for most of them.

By March 1621, not even a year after arriving, only 51 of the original 102 remained alive. It would be another two years before a ship arrived carrying supplies to help them. They were compelled to live off the land in whatever way they could.

Fortunately, some Native Americans taught the Pilgrims how to plant corn, how to fish the waters, how to find game, how to live without the comforts of England or Holland. The newcomers built houses. They farmed. They fished. They filled a storehouse with corn and other foods. At the end of the first harvest, they decided to hold a feast of celebration and have a time of thanksgiving.

A tribute to a true friend

The Spring of 1983 was an exciting time. A year earlier, Pastor Roland Gerdes, before a large congregation at the Sunbury (PA) Bible Church, was bringing a moving Wednesday evening service to a close. It was the closing for their annual missions conference. I had been invited to be the keynote speaker with a message on Sunday morning and then on Wednesday night. For the Wednesday night service, I brought a contingent of students from Northeastern Bible College to interface with the youth during the dinner hour and to bring special music. I ate with a table of missionaries who updated me on the week. Then one said, "a major topic of conversation was the Sunday morning service. I believe if you had given an invitation that many would have made commitments."

At the close of my message, I did give an invitation. Large numbers, some weeping before God as the Holy Spirit continued to bring the Word of God alive, were at the altar. The pastor looked at me and said, "Now, Mr. President, how soon can you return and conduct a prayer seminar for us?" When I explained a full schedule and the demands of a college presidency, he retorted: "Let Northeastern get another president. You need to be on the road sharing with God's church about prayer." That was the catalyst for a decision to follow his advice.

After prayer and careful analysis, Sue and I relocated to Murfreesboro, Tennessee, the very heart of my home state. As we "counted the

cost," we both knew that God was in the move and we knew that having an itinerant ministry would not be easy. As we waited upon the Lord for guidance, Paul Jennings, my Sunday school teacher at Southeast Baptist Church, an attorney, and I became friends. Not only was he an excellent attorney, he was one of the best Bible teachers whom I have ever encountered. When I approached him in early 1984 about establishing an entity to oversee the prayer seminar ministry, he agreed to draw up the Articles of Incorporation to become a non-profit organization. Incidentally, God had prepared him for this task by his doing the very same task for the Nashville Symphony a short time before. In late May, I was doing yard work when Paul appeared with the papers in hand. J. Gordon Henry Ministries was an official organization!

But that is not all. Paul's law office was in Nashville, but he had a suite of offices on the square in beautiful Murfreesboro in the heart of the city. He graciously offered these beautiful offices to be the home of both the ministry, and the Transnational Association of Christian Colleges and Schools. The address was 201 W. Main Street, Murfreesboro, Tennessee 37130. Although I have often acknowledged the role Paul Jennings played, it is time to tell the story of how God provided a true friend. His wife, Suzanne, became one of Sue's closest friends as well. **Thank you Paul and Suzanne Jennings for being our personal friends as well friends of the prayer seminar ministry.**

Both wrote letters for September-Letter Writing month that I will keep, but I want to share Paul's letter since his understanding is one that needs to be publicized.

J. Gordon:

Happy 80th. I know how it feels as on October 5, I will be 77. I appreciate receiving the **Reflector** and the **Board Reports**, to keep up with **JGHM**. Must be ordained of God to start in a small borrowed-lawyer office space and blossom into where it is now!

I know very little about seminary curriculum; do they have courses on prayer? It seems that since the disciples had to ask Jesus how to pray and how not to, not how to preach, maybe that should be a major emphasis, and perhaps it is.

What is needed is the endowment of the James Gordon Henry Chair of Prayer and let you add that to your duties for a couple of years. Just what you need, another duty!

One thing is certain, until we "His people" pray, we are not going to have the awakening we must have. That is what got us here or better said, it is this "lack" that got us here. Just like the days of old, it is not the kings or politicians but "us" that bear most of the blame.

May God grant you another span of years and like Caleb (was he 80 or 90), you too will conquer new territory. Certainly, you share his faithfulness. Best wishes,
