An Open Letter

"How can I praise my Lord enough, He's done so much for me." No day goes by when I am not consciously aware of how God has blessed my life, more intense now than ever. Through His grace, He placed a longing in my heart for Jesus even before I knew the Gospel story in its fullness. Once I understood about the great love of the Father that was demonstrated by His giving His only Son to pay for my sins, I gladly trusted that Son as my Savior and Lord. That was almost sixty-six years ago. He gave me salvation.

God has given me **a family** (parents, siblings, nieces, nephews, cousins, a wife, children, grandchildren and great-grandchildren). He has given me a host of **friends around the world**. He gave me a **ministry**. Since 1980, He has called forth **Doorkeepers** to provide the prayer and financial support needed to make the ministry possible, who continue faithful to this day.

Many of our partners are already in Heaven. On the **day of final reckoning** in heaven, each partner will surely have a share in the fruit of our ministry around the world where thousands upon thousands have been touched. I look forward to meeting with our **Doorkeepers** in Heaven to thank them for making the prayer seminar ministry a reality year after year (now thirtyfour years). We will praise the "Lamb" and rejoice when we see the fruit of our labor.

One phenomenon that remains a "wonder" to me is the strength and stamina that God gave from 1984 through 2011. When I accepted the position of Executive Director for Transnational Association of Christian Colleges and Schools (TRACS), it was with the understanding that my "main" ministry would be prayer seminars; the TRACS leadership supported this arrangement 100%. After retiring from TRACS in 1995, other than serving as an educational consultant until 2002 for a few colleges, I have devoted my life to the seminars. The "wonder" is the yearly averages from 1984 through 2011: fifty-two seminars a year (sixteen states and four countries a year. Average number of miles

traveled 74,398 and days on the road 125). God's enablement is the only explanation.

One of the most touching statements in Moses' review of Israel's history is recorded in **Deuteronomy 2:7 NIV**: "The Lord your God has blessed you in all the work of your hands. **He has watched** over your journey through the vast desert. These forty years the Lord has been with you and you have lacked nothing." In the New Testament, Paul wrote Timothy: "If we are faithless, He will remain faithful, for He cannot dis disown Himself" (2 Timothy 2:13 NIV).

Food/Strength for the journey = Strength for the day!

"Cause me to hear Your loving kindness in the morning, For in you do I trust; Cause me to know the way in which I should walk, For I lift up my soul to You." (Psalm 143:8)

In my morning devotional time, the written Word of God has a prominent role. In fact after a brief time of reflecting on the meaning of this activity, I begin my time with the Word of God reading systematically through the Bible year by year. Long ago, I came to the realization that it is more important for me to hear God's thoughts than for Him to hear mine. During this time I continue to follow the "P-Q-R-S-T" approach, which I learned as a college student and recommended to my students during the very first session with them beginning a new academic year or semester.

"P" is preview, a time to get my brain in gear. Before serious reading, I look over what I am about to read. I look at the paragraph headings and scan paragraphs allowing any word to jump out, and this often happens. "Q" is question. Based on what is highlighted in my mind, I ask questions that likely will be answered as I read. "R" is read. By using "P" and "Q," the reading is much more meaningful and my mind is focused. "S" is state. As I read, I use frequent pauses to look away from the printed page and state to myself what I have just read. "T" is test. Throughout the day, even the busiest days, I call up things I learned during the morning "Quiet Time," that touch my heart.

Since my Bible reading on the day that I am writing this text includes **Psalm 143**, I will illustrate my approach. Remember that the first task, especially in the early morning, is to get my brain in gear by "**P**" and "**Q**," preview and question. The paragraph heading in my study Bible is "Prayer for guidance." This is one of the 150 psalms and the heading is for



"Don't you know? Haven't you heard? The Lord is the eternal God, Creator of the earth. He never gets weary or tired; His wisdom cannot be measured.

The Lord gives strength to those who are weary. Even young people get tired, then stumble and fall. But all who trust [wait upon] the Lord will find new strength. They will be strong like eagles soaring upward on wings; they will walk and run, without getting tired." Isaiah 43:28-31 (Contemporary English Version). the entire psalm. Scanning the text brings out key words or phrases that are activated in my mind. Here are some words: prayer, supplications, spirit overwhelmed, remember, meditate, muse, spread out my hands, and such. A question is raised, "what is the 'prayer for guidance'?" "R" will bring forth answers! The answer is v 8 (which I chose for my Verse for the Year 2014): "Cause me to hear Your loving kindness in the morning, For in You do I trust; Cause me to know the way in which I should walk, For I lift up my soul to You."

In PSALM 143, there are many thoughts that require "S." For example, in V 5, three words encapsulate what David did "remember ... meditate ... muse." He meditated on God's past works. He recalled what God had done. He reaffirmed his trust in the Lord by so doing. V 10 places everything in a very usable way: "Teach me to do Your will, for You are my God; Your spirit is good. Lead me in the land of uprightness." "T" will have plenty of food for thought. "Show me the way I should go." "Teach me to do Your will." Each day and each hour attention will be concentrated on doing God's will for the day.

By the way, I wrote a new title for Psalm 143 in my Study Bible, "Where could I go but to the Lord?" David's example will certify that there is no better place to be! Add the last words in our key verse in your list of definitions of prayer: "Unto Thee, O Lord, do I lift up my soul." This is one of my favorite definitions.

Since I am entering my 80th year with this issue of the **Reflector**, I have decided to spend more time in my Quiet Hour with Bible in hand than any other year of my life, the Lord being my helper. Join me in the journey looking to the Word of God for the strength we need. Remember, "the people who know their God shall be strong and do exploits" (Daniel 11:32). How do we "know" God? God reveals Himself in the written Word, the Scriptures. In times like these, we need the Bible more than ever!

The protection of His child and treasure is a charge that on Himself He laid; "As thy days, thy strength shall be in measure," This the pledge He to me made.

This wonderful reminder was shared with me as 79th birthday greetings by Mary Troutman (Mrs. Marshall), my sister-in-law. Mary has been an encourager for the fiftyseven years that I have been in the Troutman family. She and Marshall reside in Owensboro, Kentucky. John Wesley, Exemplar



John Wesley has long been a hero, actually an exemplar, in my personal and professional life. Sue and I have had the privilege to visit his home in London, England a number of times, the "New Room" in Bristol, an important place in his life where one can see the imprint of either his knees or elbows on the hardwood floor, and Epworth, his birthplace. In reviewing the books in my library in light of giving them to Northeastern Baptist College, Bennington, Vermont, I picked up the Wesley's Journals (four volumes) and knew that I am not ready to part from them. Reading about his daily life in his itinerant ministry, I have learned much that has helped me in my own itinerant ministry.

Today is my seventy-ninth birthday. If Wesley was writing this he would say, "Today I enter my eightieth year." He was born June 28, 1703 and died on March 2, 1791. On Friday, June 28, 1782, he wrote in his Journal: "I entered into my eightieth year [what we would call his 79th birthday]; but, blessed be God, my time is not 'labor and sorrow." I find no more pain or bodily infirmities than at five-and-twenty. This I still impute, 1. To the power of God, fitting me for what He calls me to. 2. To my still travelling four or five thousand miles a year. 3. To my sleeping, night or day, whenever I want it. 4. To my rising at a set hour. And, 5. To my constant preaching, particularly in the morning."

Actually, Wesley had provided a little more detail when he wrote on Tuesday, June 28, 1774 [what we would term his 71st birthday]: "This being my birth-day, the first day of my seventy-second year, I was considering, How is this, that I find just the same strength as I did thirty years ago? That my sight is considerable better now, and my nerves firmer, than they were then? That I have none of the infirmities of old age, and have lost several I had in my youth? The grand cause is, the good pleasure of God, who doeth whatsoever pleaseth Him. The chief means are, 1. My constantly rising at four, for about fifty years. 2. My generally preaching at five in the morning; one of the most healthy exercises in the world. 3. My never traveling less, by sea or land, than four thousand five hundred miles in a year."

There was some change in tone expressed on Saturday, June 28, 1788, which is significant in understanding the working of the Lord: "I this day enter on my eighty-fifth year. And what cause have I to praise God, as for a thousand spiritual blessings, so for bodily blessings also! How little have I suffered yet by 'the rush of numerous years!' It is true, I am

not as agile as was in times past. I do not run or walk as fast as I did: my sight is a little decayed; my left eye is grown dim, and hardly serves me to read; I have some daily pain in the ball of my right eye, as also in my right temple (occasioned by a blow receive some months since), and in my right shoulder and arm, which I impute partly to a sprain, and partly to rheumatism. I find likewise some decay in my memory, with regard things lately passed; but not at all with regard to what I have read or heard, twenty, forty, or sixty years ago; neither do I find any decay in my hearing, smell, taste, or appetite (tho' I want but a third part of the food I did once;) nor do I feel any such thing as weariness, either in travelling or preaching: And I am not conscious of any decay in writing sermons; which I do as readily, and I believe as correctly as ever." Wesley again recites reasons for his stamina. He concludes this long entry on his 84th birthday: "Even now, though I find pain daily in my eye, or temple, or arm; yet it is never violent, and seldom lasts many minutes at a time. Whether or not this is sent to give me warning that I am shortly to guit this tabernacle, I do not know; but be it one way or the other, I have only to say,

My remnant of days

I spend to His praise

Who died the whole world to redeem: Be they many or few,

My days are His due,

And they all are devoted to Him!

I preached in the morning on Psalm xc.12; in the evening on Acts xiii.40, 41; and endeavored to improve the hours between to the best advantage."

On Sunday, June 28, 1789, Wesley wrote: "In the conclusion of the morning service we had a remarkable blessing; and the same in the evening, moving the whole congregation as the heart of one man. This day I enter on my eightysixth year. I now find I grow old: 1. My sight is decayed; so that I cannot read a small print, unless in a strong light. 2. My strength is decayed; so that I walk much slower than I did some years since: 3. My memory of names, whether of persons or places, is decayed; till I stop a little to recollect them. What I should be afraid of, is, if I took thought for the morrow, that my body would weigh down my mind; and create other stubbornness, by the decrease of my understanding; or peevishness, by the increase of bodily infirmities: But Thou shalt answer for me, O Lord my God."

His last birthday entry came on Monday, June 28, 1790: "This day I enter into my eighty-eighth year [birthday, 87th]. For above eighty-six years, I found none of the infirmities of old age; my eyes did not wax dim, neither was my natural strength abated: But last August 1 [1789], I found almost a sudden change. My eyes were so dim, that no glasses would help me. My strength likewise now quite forsook me; and probably will not return in this world. But I feel no pain from head to foot; only it seems nature is exhausted; and, humanly speaking, will sink more and more, till

The weary springs of life stand still at last."

For Wesley, the "springs of life" on this earth stood still on March 2, 1791 in the "eighty-eighth year" of his earthly life.

Thanks be to God

Thankfulness is a Christian grace. Psalm 96 and Psalm 103 are among the loftiest expression of praise and thankfulness found in the Scriptures. Psalm 96 is a hymn of pure praise, acknowledging Jehovah as the true God, calling upon all nations to adore Him, and urging Israel so to serve the Lord that the heathen will come to worship Him. "Sing ... Proclaim ... Declare ... For the Lord is great and greatly to be praised ... Give to the Lord the glory due His name ... Oh, worship the Lord in the beauty of holiness" (vv 2, 3, 8, 9). Psalm 103 is an outburst of pure thanksgiving in recognition of God's countless mercies and especially because of His forgiving love. Could anything be more beautiful. more sublime, or more instructive than these verses? Reading, studying, and meditating upon this psalm will provide spiritual instruction of utmost importance and, even better, will lift one's soul up in grateful praise.

Try thanksgiving! "In everything give thanks" (1 Thessalonians 5:18). As you gather on Thanksgiving Day 2014, have someone ready to read Psalm 96 and another to read Psalm 103. During your prayer time, go around the table and let everyone state one blessing from God for which he/she is thankful.



Good questions



I have shared thoughts concerning the seventy-nine years that are now history, but I want to share my thoughts related to the present and the future.

Age has brought some limitations for both Sue and me; we are learning to make adjustments accordingly. It has not been many years ago that I could stand on a Saturday and teach for six hours (the amount of time required to conduct a full prayer seminar). Then on Sunday, I could stand for another six hours teaching another prayer seminar. Now I teach sitting, only occasionally standing to teach. Whereas I could accept invitations for social events following a prayer seminar, I now excuse myself.

During these thirty-four years, I thought nothing to get on a plane and fly for ten hours. Now I implement a plan to move around during a long flight instead of simply sitting, reading, writing, and preparing myself spiritually.

Now that I have entered my eightieth year, here is what I propose knowing that "man proposes, but God disposes:" continue available for national seminars as God opens doors;

2. limit international seminars to no more than two a year;

3. "hold the ropes" for nationals to conduct prayer seminars;

4. continue the monthly **Reflectors**.5. continue writing books;

6.use our website, e-mails, phone calls, and notes/letters to touch as many lives as possible.

7. inform as many people as possible about the availability of the books/ booklets that I have written and to seek to make them available in as many languages as possible.

I eagerly seek the will of God and practice obedience when He speaks to me out of the Word and through the moving of the Holy Spirit. I know WHERE GOD GUIDES, HE PROVIDES. IN A NUTSHELL, I WANT EVERY DAY OF THE REMAINING DAYS I HAVE TO COUNT FOR JESUS.

I am grateful for what God has done in entrusting me with the content of the prayer seminar. I am grateful for every door He has opened (1,613 seminars in fifty-eight nations). I am grateful to God and each person who has helped with prayer and financial support.
